<u>Docomomo US National Symposium</u> May 31 - June 5, 2022 Philadelphia, PA

The Northern California (NOCA) Chapter of Docomomo US is pleased to offer <u>one</u> grant for a <u>student or emerging professional</u> to participate in the virtual Docomomo US National Symposium 2022 event on May 31-June 5, 2022 in Philadelphia, PA. The deadline for applications has been extended to **Friday**, **April 8, 2022.**

About the 2022 National Symposium

The Docomomo US National Symposium is the primary event in the United States for professionals to discuss and share efforts to study and preserve Modern architecture and meet leading practitioners and industry professionals. Held annually, this multi-day conference seeks to engage local participants in cities across the United States, offering participants the ability to explore a wide variety of significant modern architecture and sites.

The U.S. Modern Movement in architecture is broadly defined as the period from 1930-1970s. Buildings or sites of the period often looked to the future without overt references to historical precedent; expressed functional, technical, or spatial properties; and were conscious of being modern, expressing the principles of modern design. The architecture produced during this period took on many forms and represented a range of complex ideologies.

Yo! Modernism! In the Philadelphia region, "yo" is a colloquialism used to get someone's attention quickly. It's a phrase without pretense, and when combined with Modernism, it puts into focus the importance of place and community in our modern heritage, as well as the urgency of preservation efforts. The 2022 Docomomo US National Symposium will explore why Modernism still has the power to turn heads, to inform, and to adapt, and how its many manifestations reflect on local, regional, and broader goals.

From pared-down Classicism to space-age whimsy, from the streamlined to the sculptural, from the monumental to the everyday, the multi-layered, multi-generational Modernism found in Philadelphia reflects ideas found around the world, and we look forward to exploring these ideas further.

Docomomo US/NOCA Symposium Grant for Students & Emerging Professionals

Purpose

The Docomomo US/NOCA Symposium Grant provides financial support for students and emerging professionals committed to the documentation and conservation of Modern Movement buildings, landscapes, and sites. The intent of this year's scholarship is to enable <u>one</u> individual to participate in the Docomomo US 2022 National Symposium.

Scholarship

The 2022 Docomomo US/NOCA Symposium Grant provides a single grant (up to \$2,500) for related expenses, including (but not limited to):

- Registration to National Symposium sessions, receptions, forum, and tours
- Travel expenses to and from National Symposium
- Lodging expenses during the National Symposium
- Meals during the National Symposium (excluding alcohol)
- Public transit during the National Symposium (to/from events, tours, etc. related to the symposium)

Eligibility

The scholarship is open to <u>current undergraduate</u>, <u>graduate</u>, <u>and doctoral students enrolled in established institutions of higher learning</u>, <u>as well as emerging professionals who have graduated within the past three years</u>.

Applicants must be actively engaged in issues concerning the documentation and conservation of buildings, sites, and neighborhoods of the Modern Movement. "Documentation" may be in the form of research or scholarship, such as thesis or class projects, related to architecture, design, or planning

topics associated with the 20th Century Modern Movement. Preference will be given to applicants with current or previous engagement on topics related to Northern California.

Applicants are asked to demonstrate their committed interest in the subject and how the scholarship will meaningfully advance their goals or work.

Reporting Requirements

Within one month of the Symposium, the grant recipients are required to <u>submit a brief article</u> (500 words) on their experience at the symposium. The article will be published in the Docomomo US newsletter.

To be considered for the Docomomo US/NOCA grant award, please submit your application by **Friday April 8, 2022.** Applicants will be accepted on a rolling basis. All interested candidates are encouraged to apply early. Details for applying follow.

Application to include:

- 1. **Statement** (in English, up to 250 words) that explains how this grant will meaningfully advance your goals, scholarship, or work. Please discuss:
 - Your research interests in the Modern Movement in Northern California and how your research will contribute to the scholarship or body of knowledge on Northern California Modernist architecture and design
 - What you hope to learn and accomplish by attending the Docomomo US National Symposium
- 2. Curriculum vitae (2 pages maximum)

Deadlines

Applicants will be accepted and notified on a rolling basis. We encourage all interested applicants to apply early.
